6. Discussion From The Floor - None

7. Public Works Report

Public Works Director Randall reported that the Public Works Department continues to mow, weed and collect garbage; continues to paint crosswalks and stop bars on the streets; completed aerating and fertilizing the parks; patched potholes; cleaned all the sewer lines; started repairs on the winter equipment; and completed reading water meters.

8. Code Enforcement Report

Building Official Brainard reported that he attended the Council meetings on September 8th and 21st; a Department Head meeting on September 9th; a Zoning Code Amendment workshop on September 14th; a MN Building Permit Technician Association meeting on September 22nd; and the North Suburban Building Official's meeting on September 29th.

Mr. Brainard stated that in September 2015, 112 permits were issued. He reported that he conducted 104 inspections in September.

Mr. Brainard reported that the September 2015 vacancy listing shows that there are 20 vacant/foreclosed residential properties currently posted and/or soon posted by the Code Enforcement Department, which is down two from last month. There are three vacant/foreclosed commercial properties, which remains the same from last month; and 16 residential properties currently occupied and ready for Sheriff sale, which is down one from last month. He reported that eight violation notices were issued in September by the Code Enforcement Department. He reported that three administrative offense tickets were issued.

Mr. Brainard provided a copy of the handout for residents who want to expand their existing driveway.

9. New Business

A. Authorize RFP for Facility Assessment/Space Needs Analysis

Administrator Buchholtz reposted that the June 8, 2015 Council Workshop, staff presented the City Council with a draft 2015-2019 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). He stated that in the draft CIP, there were a number of items that addressed deferred maintenance for City Hall. The City Council, after reviewing these items, came to the consensus that a facility assessment/space needs analysis be completed prior to investing money in deferred maintenance.

Administrator Buchholtz stated that based on the consensus, staff has drafted a request for proposals (RFP) that will be sent to architectural firms for this project. He stated that proposals will be due by 4 PM on Friday, October 30, 2015. He reported that staff anticipates that the proposal review and interviews take place in the month of November, with a final recommendation brought forward to the City Council on December 7, 2015. He stated that work on the project would commence in January 2016.

He reported the funding for the project will come from the General Fund (2016 budget) and the Recreation Program Fund (Fund 244).



Submitted for Council Meeting – October 19, 2015

The Spring Lake Park Police Department responded to four hundred and forty-one calls for service for the month of September 2015. This is compared to responding to four hundred and fifty-six calls for service in September 2014.

The police department for the month of September 2015 issued one hundred and sixty-one citations. This is compared to issuing one hundred and thirty-three citations is September of 2014. During the month of September 2015 the police department deployed our speed trailer at thirteen different locations throughout our city to remind residents and those visiting our community of their speeds while traveling on our city streets.

With school now back in session for the year, our School Resource Officer, Officer Fiske reports handling twenty-one calls for service at our schools, along with also conducting eighteen student contacts, ten escorts and four follow up investigations. As with other years, Officer Fiske notes that thefts continue to be an issue at the schools. Officer Fisk, School Staff and myself would like to remind parents and students not to bring items to school that are not needed and also if you do bring items to school, to please not leave them unattended or unsecured. Theft is a crime of opportunity, if we remove the opportunities, then the thefts will stop. Officer Fiske noted that the police department had received reports of a suspicious vehicle around the school campus, where the male driver was stopping students to talk to them and that an attempt to locate/stop and identify had been issued for the vehicle and driver. Officer Fiske advised that she was able to locate the suspicious vehicle and identify the driver. The individual was clear wants and warrants and was trespassed from school properties. For further details see Officer Fiske's attached report.

Investigator Baker reports handling a case load of fifty-five cases for the month of September 2015. Thirty-four of these cases were felony in nature, nine of the cases were gross misdemeanor in nature and twelve of these cases were misdemeanor in nature. Investigator Baker also notes having six active

forfeiture cases that he continues to monitor. Investigator Baker continues to work on his case load in a diligent manner to try and bring each and every case to a conclusion as soon as possible. For further details see Investigator Baker's attached report.

The Spring Lake Park Police Department Office Staff remain steadfast in their duties, typing and imaging reports, filing, answering and dispensing phone calls for service and information, while continuing to address citizen concerns at the "Police Public Walk up Window", along with other duties that may be assigned on a daily basis. The police department office staff also continue on a daily basis to prepare for the implementation of the new Public Safety Data System scheduled for the beginning of November 2015.

The month of September 2015 has been a busy month for myself as well. Besides handling the day to day operations of the police department, I have attended numerous meetings to include but not limited to:

- Holding two meetings with Computer Integration Technologies, Inc. (CIT). representatives for exploring IT services for the Police Department.
- Attending a Department Head meeting held here at City Hall
- Attending a meeting of the Anoka County Chiefs of Police Held in Coon Rapids,

- I also continue to monitor and orchestrate the hiring process for a new police officer



On August 3, 2015, CenterPoint Energy filed a request with the Minnesota Public Utilities Commission (MPUC) for an increase in natural gas rates of \$54.1 million or approximately 6.4 percent per year. On September 22, 2015, the MPUC accepted our filing as complete and approved an interim (temporary) rate increase of \$47.8 million or about 5.65 percent more than current rates. This interim rate increase for CenterPoint Energy customers takes effect October 2, 2015, and continues until the MPUC issues a final order and the company implements new rates in the summer of 2016.

State law requires us to distribute a Notice of Application for Rate Increase and Notice of and Order for Hearing to all counties and municipalities in our service area (enclosed). CenterPoint Energy has asked the Minnesota Public Utilities Commission (MPUC) to increase its rates for natural gas distribution service. The requested increase is for \$54.1 million, or about 6.4 percent per year. The requested increase would add about \$5.15 to a typical residential customer's monthly bill.

While the MPUC reviews CenterPoint Energy's request, state law allows CenterPoint Energy to collect higher rates on an interim (temporary) basis. The interim rate increase is \$47.8 million or about 5.65 percent more than current rates. The increase appears on your bill as Interim Rate Adjustment.

The MPUC will likely make its decision on our rate request in the summer of 2016. If final rates are lower than interim rates, we will refund customers the difference with interest. If final rates are higher than interim rates, we will not charge customers the difference.

Why is CenterPoint Energy asking for an increase?

Our last request for a rate increase was in 2013. Since that time, we have made and continue to make significant investments to serve our customers. These investments, such as our ongoing pipeline replacement programs, maintain the safety and reliability of our natural gas system and benefit our customers and communities.

In particular, we are improving and modernizing natural gas pipelines and distribution mains throughout several neighborhoods in our service areas.

Here's how the rate change will affect monthly bills:

The proposed rate changes will affect individual monthly bills differently depending on natural gas use and customer type. Bills will also vary because the wholesale cost of natural gas changes each month. Customers' bills contain three parts: Basic Charge, Delivery Charge and Cost of Gas. The proposed Basic Charges and Delivery Charges cover the cost of delivering natural gas service to our customers – about 40 percent of the bill. The Cost of Gas covers wholesale gas costs– about 60 percent of the bill. The Cost of Gas is passed through directly to customers without mark-up. This rate increase does not affect the Cost of Gas.

PROCEDURAL HISTORY

On August 3, 2015, CenterPoint Energy Resources Corp. d/b/a CenterPoint Energy Minnesota Gas (CenterPoint or the Company) filed a general rate case seeking an annual rate increase of \$54.1 million or approximately 6.4 percent per year, together with a proposed interim rate schedule. On August 4, 2015, the Commission issued a notice to potentially interested parties requesting comments on whether the Commission should accept the filing as substantially complete and whether it should refer the case to the Office of Administrative Hearings for contested case proceedings.

The only parties to file comments were the Minnesota Department of Commerce, Division of Energy Resources (the Department), which filed comments on August 13, 2015, and the Office of the Attorney General-Residential Utilities and Antitrust Division (OAG), which filed comments on August 18, 2015.

On August 20, 2015, CenterPoint filed reply comments.

On September 10, 2015, the Commission met to consider the matter.

Contemporaneously with this order, the Commission issued two other orders in this case—one finding the rate case filing to be substantially complete and suspending the proposed rates, and one setting an interim rate schedule for use during the suspension period. The Commission also issued an order setting a new base cost of gas in a companion docket, filed this same date.¹

FINDINGS AND CONCLUSIONS

I. Jurisdiction and Referral for Contested Case Proceedings

The Commission has jurisdiction over proposed rate changes under Minn. Stat. § 216B.16. If the Commission is unable to resolve all significant issues regarding the reasonableness of the proposed rates on the basis of the filing itself, the Commission is to refer the matter to the Office of Administrative Hearings for contested case proceedings. Minn. Stat. § 216B.16, subd. 2.

The Commission finds that it cannot satisfactorily resolve all questions regarding the reasonableness of the proposed rates on the basis of the Company's filing. The Commission will therefore refer the matter to the Office of Administrative Hearings for contested case proceedings.

II. Issues to be Addressed

Parties shall specifically and thoroughly address the following issues (e.g., in testimony, at hearing, and, if applicable, in settlement documents) in the course of the contested case proceedings ordered herein:

- (1) Is the test year revenue increase sought by the Company reasonable or will it result in unreasonable and excessive earnings by the Company?
- (2) Is the rate design proposed by the Company reasonable?
- (3) Are the Company's proposed capital structure, cost of capital, and return on equity reasonable?
- (4) Is there additional discussion, development, and/or detailed information that the Company can provide regarding corporate allocations as discussed in Kirk Nesvig's Schedule 53 and corresponding work-papers, including the following:
 - A. Legislative Advocacy, Cost Element 646407, total test year allocation of \$72,851. Additional information should, at a minimum, include a discussion regarding the nature of the advocacy being done and a reconciliation of how the funds are being spent;
 - B. Community Relations Direct, Cost Element 646242, total test year allocation of over \$700,000. Additional information should, at a minimum, include a discussion regarding the type of community relations being done and a reconciliation of how the funds are being spent;
 - C. Donations, Cost Elements 646117, 646118, 646121, 646123, 646218, and 646222, total test year allocations of over \$500,000. Additional information should, include at a minimum, a discussion regarding the groups getting the donations, including where they are located and a reconciliation of how the funds are being spent;

- D. Miscellaneous Business Expenses, Cost Elements 646109, 646110, 646111, 646113, 646114, 646116, 646133, 646211, 646212, 646214, 646215, 646308, 646312, and 646358, total test year allocations of over \$100,000. Additional information should, at a minimum, include a discussion of what type of miscellaneous charges are included in these accounts and a reconciliation of how the funds are being spent.
- E. Cost Element 646150, total test year allocation of \$18,558. Additional information should, at a minimum, include a description/title for the cost element, the nature of the expense, and a reconciliation of how the funds are being spent.
- F. Cost Element 646151, total test year allocation of \$1,684. Additional information should, at a minimum, include a description/title for the cost element, the nature of the expense, and a reconciliation of how the funds are being spent.

- L. Xchrgs to Finance, Cost Element 646343, total test year allocation of almost \$800,000. Additional information should, at a minimum, include a discussion regarding what is the nature of these "xchrgs" and a reconciliation of how the funds are being spent.

- M. Xchrgs to Reg Ops, Cost Element 646346, total test year allocation of over \$280,000. Additional information should, at a minimum, include a discussion regarding what is the nature of these "xchrgs" and a reconciliation of how the funds are being spent.
- N. Xchrgs to Communications, Cost Element 646347, total test year allocation of over \$230,000. Additional information should, at a minimum, include a discussion regarding what is the nature of these "xchrgs" and a reconciliation of how the funds are being spent.
- O. Xchrgs to Legal, Cost Element 646348, total test year allocation of over \$130,000. Additional information should, at a minimum, include a discussion regarding what is the nature of these "xchrgs" and a reconciliation of how the funds are being spent.
- P. Xchrgs to Exec Mgmt, Cost Element 646349, total test year allocation of almost \$7,627. Additional information should, at a minimum, include a discussion regarding what is the nature of these "xchrgs" and a reconciliation of how the funds are being spent.
- Q. Xchrgs to Business Spt Svc, Cost Element 646350, total test year allocation of over \$250,000. Additional information should, at a minimum, include a discussion regarding what is the nature of these "xchrgs" and a reconciliation of how the funds are being spent.

In its Order Accepting Filing and Suspending Rates, the Commission will also require CenterPoint to file supplemental testimony or exhibits reflecting any updated sales forecasts from its general rate case in its per dekatherm demand cost of gas rate. The Commission requests that updates be filed in this docket and the related base cost of gas docket, G-008/MR-15-728.

The parties may also raise and address other issues relevant to the Company's proposed rate increase.

III. Procedural Outline

A. Administrative Law Judge

The Administrative Law Judge assigned to this case is Eric L. Lipman. His address and telephone number are as follows: Office of Administrative Hearing, 600 North Robert Street, St. Paul, Minnesota 55101 and (651) 361-7842. His mailing address is P.O. Box 64620, St. Paul, Minnesota 55164-0620.

B. Hearing Procedure

Controlling Statutes and Rules

Hearings in this matter will be conducted in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act, Minn. Stat. §§ 14.57 – 14.62; the rules of the Office of Administrative Hearings, Minn. Rules, parts 1400.5100 to 1400.8400; and, to the extent that they are not superseded by those rules, the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, Minn. Rules, parts 7829.0100 to 7829.3200.

Copies of these rules and statutes may be purchased from the Print Communications Division of the Department of Administration, 660 Olive Street, St. Paul, Minnesota 55155; (651) 297-3000. These rules and statutes also appear on the State of Minnesota's website at www.revisor.mn.gov/pubs.

The Office of Administrative Hearings conducts contested case proceedings in accordance with the Minnesota Rules of Professional Conduct and the Professionalism Aspirations adopted by the Minnesota State Bar Association.

Right to Counsel and to Present Evidence

In these proceedings, parties may be represented by counsel, may appear on their own behalf, or may be represented by another person of their choice, unless otherwise prohibited as the unauthorized practice of law. They have the right to present evidence, conduct cross-examination, and make written and oral argument. Under Minn. Rules, part 1400.7000, they may obtain subpoenas to compel the attendance of witnesses and the production of documents.

Parties should bring to the hearing all documents, records, and witnesses necessary to support their positions.

Discovery and Informal Disposition

Any questions regarding discovery under Minn. Rules, parts 1400.6700 to 1400.6800 or informal disposition under Minn. Rules, part 1400.5900 should be directed to Robert Harding, Financial Analysis Unit Supervisor, Minnesota Public Utilities Commission, 121 7th Place East, Suite 350, St. Paul, Minnesota 55101-2147, (651) 201-2237.

• Protecting Not-Public Data

State agencies are required by law to keep some data not public. Parties must advise the Administrative Law Judge if not-public data is offered into the record. They should take note that any not-public data admitted into evidence may become public unless a party objects and requests relief under Minn. Stat. § 14.60, subd. 2.

Accommodations for Disabilities; Interpreter Services

At the request of any individual, this agency will make accommodations to ensure that the hearing in this case is accessible. The agency will appoint a qualified interpreter if necessary. Persons must promptly notify the Administrative Law Judge if an interpreter is needed.

Scheduling Issues

The times, dates, and places of public and evidentiary hearings in this matter will be set by order of the Administrative Law Judge after consultation with the Commission and intervening parties.

• Notice of Appearance

Any party intending to appear at the hearing must file a notice of appearance (Attachment A) with the Administrative Law Judge within 20 days of the date of this Notice and Order for Hearing.

• Sanctions for Non-compliance

Failure to appear at a prehearing conference, a settlement conference, or the hearing, or failure to comply with any order of the Administrative Law Judge, may result in facts or issues being resolved against the party who fails to appear or comply.

C. Parties and Intervention

The current parties to this case are the Company and the Department of Commerce's Division of Energy Resources and the Office of the Attorney General-Residential Utilities and Antitrust Division. Other persons wishing to become formal parties shall promptly file petitions to intervene with the Administrative Law Judge. They shall serve copies of such petitions on all current parties and on the Commission. Minn. Rules, part 1400.6200.

D. Prehearing Conference

A prehearing conference will be held on September 28, 2015 at 1:30 p.m. in the Small Hearing Room at the offices of the Public Utilities Commission, 121 Seventh Place East, Suite 350, St. Paul, Minnesota 55101-2147.

Persons participating in the prehearing conference should be prepared to discuss time frames, scheduling, discovery procedures, and similar issues. Potential parties are invited to attend the pre-hearing conference and to file their petitions to intervene as soon as possible.

E. Time Constraints

The Commission is required to act on substantially complete rate case filings within ten months, although this ten-month period can be extended under certain circumstances. The Commission asks the Office of Administrative Hearings to conduct contested case proceedings in light of these time constraints and requests that the Administrative Law Judge submit his final report on or before April 1, 2016, to permit adequate consideration of the case by the Commission.

If the statutory deadline for the Commission's decision is extended beyond the normal ten months at any point during this proceeding for any reason (e.g., settlement discussions, waiver, etc.), the Commission requests that the ALJ's report be submitted at least two months before the extended deadline for the Commission's decision.

IV. Application of Ethics in Government Act

The lobbying provisions of the Ethics in Government Act, Minn. Stat. §§ 10A.01 et seq., apply to general rate cases. Persons appearing in this proceeding may be subject to registration, reporting, and other requirements set forth in that Act. All persons appearing in this case are urged to refer to the Act and to contact the Campaign Finance and Public Disclosure Board, telephone number (651) 539-1180, with any questions.

V. Ex Parte Communications

Restrictions on *ex parte* communications with Commissioners and reporting requirements regarding such communications with Commission staff apply to this proceeding from the date of this Order. Those restrictions and reporting requirements are set forth at Minn. Rules, parts 7845.7300 – 7845.7400, which all parties are urged to consult.

VI. Notices Required; Delegation of Authority

Finally, the rate case statute and the Commission's rules require comprehensive notice of proposed general rate increases. Those notices are required in the ordering paragraphs below, and to promote administrative efficiency, the Commission will delegate to the Executive Secretary the authority to approve customer notices, bill inserts, and bill formats for the duration of this proceeding.

ORDER

- 1. The Commission hereby refers this case to the Office of Administrative Hearings for contested case proceedings, as set forth above.
- 2. The Company shall promptly mail copies of this Order to all municipalities, counties, and local governing authorities within its Minnesota service area.
- 3. Public hearings shall be held in this case at locations within the service area of the Company; those locations shall be set by the Administrative Law Judge after consultation with the parties and Commission staff.
- 4. The Company shall give the following notices of the evidentiary and public hearings:
 - A. Individual written notice to each customer, which may be in the form of a bill insert, and shall be served at least ten days before the first day of hearings.

- B. Written notice to the governing bodies of all municipalities, counties, and local governing bodies in the area affected and to all parties in the Company's last two rate cases. These notices shall be mailed at least ten days before the first day of hearings.
- C. Display advertisements in legal newspapers of affected counties and other newspapers of general circulation within the Company's Minnesota service area. These advertisements shall appear at least ten days before the first day of hearings. They shall include the heading **RATE INCREASE NOTICE**, which heading shall appear in bold face type no smaller than 30 points.
- 5. The Company shall submit proposed notices for Commission approval prior to publication or service.
- 6. The Commission delegates to the Executive Secretary the authority to approve customer notices, bill inserts, and bill formats for the duration of this proceeding.
- 7. This Order shall become effective immediately.



■ Creating More Than 5,500 New Jobs

The company's multi-year commitment to create more than 5,500 new customer service jobs will begin with the addition of three new state-of-the-art customer support centers in Albuquerque, N.M.; Spokane, Wash.; and Tucson, Ariz. More than 2,000 new employees will be hired at these centers. The first new center, which will open in Albuquerque, will be staffed with bilingual employees who will support Spanish-speaking customers across the country. Sites for the two centers in Tucson and Spokane will be operational later this year. The company is also tripling the size of its social care team to serve customers more quickly on Twitter, Facebook and other social platforms, and hiring 250 team members to serve in its Xfinity Stores across the country.

To meet the goal of never being late and respecting customers' time, Comcast is hiring hundreds of additional technicians across the country and strengthening Comcast dispatch teams and operations. 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

It is astonishing how many Fridley residents have been contacted by scammers either over the phone, by email or through the mail. Scammers use aggression, scare tactics, threats and emotions to try to steal your money. Partnerships with Police, with City leaders and officials, and with neighbors help you understand what types of scams are happening and what resources you have available for prevention. Trust your instincts. Never send money or share personal information without doing a little homework.

What you should know about money scams:

 The IRS or any other government agency will never call demanding money or threatening jail time. A true government agency will always send an official, written notification through US Mail of any tax due. They will never request credit card, debit card or prepaid card information over the phone or email.

- Door-to-Door Sales need to be licensed through the
 City of Fridley and you should ask to see their
 solicitor's permit. We require criminal background
 checks on all solicitors to offer you some protection.
 A common solicitor concern this time of year is with
 alarm sales. Aggressive tactics are used to convince
 homeowners to purchase expensive equipment or
 services that you may not need or want. Changes or
 upgrades from your current service provider are
 normally announced by mail, not by an
 unannounced visitor.
- Be wary of any "limited-time offers" that require immediate action without giving you time to investigate or verify.
- You have the right to ask a salesperson to leave.

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Community Development News What's Coming, What's Going and What's Changing


Northern Stacks (4800 East River Road)

This 122-acre development is moving forward ahead of schedule! Over a million square feet of the original Northern Pump/FMC/BAE building is already gone, no longer even evident on the site.

The northern portion of the building will remain and be re-faced and given a modern exterior. This portion will continue to house BAE's highly technical divisions such as engineering. The southern end of this portion will house a cafeteria for on-site dining for BAE staff and visitors. Indoor dining and an outdoor patio will make it an enjoyable place for lunch, in an area that currently has few food options.

The exterior elevation transformation will include a finish sometimes called digital camouflage which will present a very smart hightech appearance to match the work going on within its walls.

Paul Hyde, developer for Northern Stacks, would like to begin footings for the next office industrial building before winter. This one will be on the southwest corner of the campus, positioned between the new building at the southeast corner and East River Road.





The historic brick smoke stacks (with the prestigious Battle-E awards proudly displayed) will NOT be demolished. Those stacks are the namesake of the industrial development and will not only remain but will lead visitors to a small, on-site artifact museum, planned by the developer to pay homage to the history of the site. The esteemed Battle-E awards are given normally only to military ships, but were instead given to this unique manufacturing complex.

Fridley Market (University Ave and I-694 area)

Plans are underway for a new 8,400 sq. ft. building in the area between McDonald's (on 57th Avenue) and the Holiday Gas Station. Proposed new tenants for the building include Caribou Coffee, Great Clips and Pancheros Mexican Grille. Construction is likely to start soon on this project. As of the time of this article, the city is awaiting announcement from Tri-Land Development regarding their selected contractor before work begins.

Also within this Tri-Land Development area, a preliminary plat has been approved by the City Council for the addition of a 124-bed hotel called WoodSpring Suites®. It is possible that construction will begin this fall for this addition as well.



Cielo Apartments (University Ave NE between 58th and 61st Avenues)

The first building of the Cielo complex is really beginning to take shape and giving us a general idea of what the final product will look like. Here are a few answers to commonly asked questions:

Q. Is the building going to remain that green color?

A. No. The green board currently exposed is a very high quality subsurface for the wall that replaces the more traditional building sheathing and building paper. The green exterior serves as a replacement for the building paper itself. Exterior surfaces will be covered with earth-toned materials such as brick, stone or architectural panels or tiles.



- Q. What is that on the white part on the walls of the bottom floor?
- A. That is the garage. Access will be on the east side of the building. The garage parking is secured for residents, and guests will park on the east side in designated parking areas. This portion of the building is white because it is a special concrete form that insulates the wall and bonds the concrete for strength. This surface, similar to the green surface, will eventually be covered with earth-toned finished materials.

- Q. Are those vertical concrete posts that were recently poured to affix high barricade bumpers?
- A. No, those concrete posts are the interior surfaces that will soon have brick attached to and surrounding them. Stone caps on top of them will be the finishing touch. They are designed to match/complement the existing brick bollards along this segment of University and eventually attached to black aluminum fence sections.
- Q. Why is the building so close to the road?
- A. This is a purposeful design that makes the building more prominent and is the first large-scale design as part of the City's Transit Oriented District (TOD). Once completed, a very nice landscape plan will be installed including a new sidewalk and bollard lighting. This will add a lighted dimension along University Avenue and introduce a new sense of vitality when combined with the architecture of the building.
- Q. When will construction be complete?
- A. Trident Development indicates the project will take a year to build and a year to fill. The building is expected to be completed around the first quarter of 2016, and during the first quarter of 2017 the second building will likely be ready to build. Both buildings will have a similar look with a skyway connecting them.
- Q. Is this a low income development?
- A. No, this is a Market Rate Complex and a minimum annual household income of \$40,000 will be required to qualify to rent.

Central and 53rd Avenue

A new building is emerging on the corner of 53rd Avenue and Central where the former gas station and convenience store once stood. Starbucks Coffee will be moving into the south end of the building, with a drive through window on the West and South sides. AT&T will be on the building's north end.


A third tenant is expected to be a restaurant, which has yet to be announced.



A Trip Down Memory Lane

Most of us remember Columbia Arena for youth hockey or the slice of fame it brought Fridley with filming of Mighty Ducks D-3, but for Gretchen Nicholls it brings back fond memories of "The Muppets."

If her name sounds familiar, it is because Gretchen played a vital role in the Columbia Arena discussions as the facilitator at the public workshops



last spring. Her history with Columbia Arena keeps this project close to her heart. No, she did not skate. She was a breakdancer – a Fozzie Bear breakdancer with The Muppet Show on Tour stage show!

"We rehearsed the show for a month at the Columbia Arena back in 1984," remembers Gretchen. "Breakdancing in a bear suit is certainly not easy. The audience loved it when I started spinning on the ground, or threw a wave from my fingertips down to my toes! The bear suit really accentuated the moves. I gave Fozzie a certain coolfactor (not that he wasn't already cool)."

Gretchen's Fozzie suit weighed 40 pounds, and she describes it as "wearing a big rug." The costumes were designed so that the mouth could be operated through a hand-held mechanism which took a lot of practice to master. Gretchen worked closely with Jim Henson's studio, especially his wife, Jane, to get it just right. The tour lasted a year and traveled by bus all across the county, including a month in New York. Gretchen's act, "Rappin' Fozzie," was a show favorite.

Just another example of the history and brush with fame that lives in our hearts through the Columbia Arena.



Columbia Arena Update

Probably the most-asked about change in Fridley is the former Columbia Arena site. By the time this newsletter arrives in homes, arena demolition will likely be complete.

The layer of soil/sand spread across the north parking lot is the DNR and City consultant's solution to release any vapors that may be trapped in the soil from the refrigeration process to create ice inside the building. When the soil is spread out, it releases any remnant vapors resulting in no contamination left and the soil can be managed like any other soil. Some may have noticed two piles of sand earlier. These were the test piles, proving that this spreading of the soil was successful in managing Freon vapor.

There is no exact timeline for what comes next. The City Council and HRA have reviewed the information created during the four citizen workshops that took place last spring. There was a clear public message from those sessions that a civic presence on this site would be important. The Council is taking that very seriously and evaluating the possibilities and costs involved.

At the September 28, 2015, Council meeting, the City Council will likely continue this discussion as they also consider the possibility of a new government complex to house City Hall, Police, Fire and Public Works, relocating certain portions and/or remodeling the current buildings to provide better accessibility and bring them up to code, and to address substantial repair and spacing issues. At this time, no decisions have been made, but by the time you read this, we may have more information. Nearly 800 hours of citizen input has gone into recommendations for the redevelopment of this area, and that is an invaluable resource for our City leaders.

Apartment Recycling Challenge

Recycling in Fridley apartment complexes is decreasing and currently sits at less than ¼ of the state requirement. Max Cowger, City Recycling and Sustainability Intern, dove into research and conversation to help improve this trend.

Step 1: Research

Visit to dumpster after dumpster led to the same results: people are throwing away too much cardboard, too many plastic bottles and too much junk mail. At the same time, he found every kind of trash imaginable in the recycling bins.

Step 2: Focus Group

Max invited a group of apartment managers, and City and County staff for a brainstorming session. They had one goal - raise awareness and develop a plan to improve recycling efforts. Everyone agreed that putting recyclables in the garbage drives up the cost of running a building, which can affect rent increases. It was interesting to learn that the apartment complexes with cameras in the garbage and recycling areas had fewer garbagerelated problems and less dumping of mattresses and junk furniture. We also learned that some recycling haulers stop picking up recycling carts due to contamination by things such as grease.

Step 3: Educate

Our next step is to get every one on board! Recycling can be confusing, for both apartment residents and homeowners alike. What are #1 - 7 plastics? Pizza cardboard verses cereal boxes – what is the difference?

Don't give up! Recycling is an important and necessary effort for our future, and we want to help. Watch for new signs and posters, developed from the focus group meeting, to be posted in apartment hallways, laundry rooms, and on the recycling bins and garbage dumpsters—visual reminders of what can and can't be put in recycling containers.




Public Works Update

2015 Street Improvement Project

Work has begun for the 2015 Street Improvement Project. City Council accepted a proposed bid from Kuechle Underground in August, 15% below the total project budget. The project is underway in the Summit Manor neighborhood, south of I-694 and west of University Avenue, and includes 2.8 miles of street rehabilitation. Every local street in this area, with the exception of 53rd Avenue, will be under construction sometime through August 2016. Work being done includes recycling of existing pavement and new street surfacing, and replacement of portions of existing sanitary sewer and watermain. CenterPoint Energy is also completing gas main replacement as a part of this project. Thank you for your patience as we improve and prolong the life of Fridley streets. Please remember to be safe and drive cautiously wherever you see construction warning signs and cones.

- Hughes Avenue from Panorama Avenue to Horizon Drive
- Capitol Street north of Hughes Avenue

Construction on these improvements will be coordinated with the 2015 Street Project.

Additional Sewer Improvements

The Metropolitan Council Environmental Services (MCES) is currently making sewer upgrades in Fridley, which will continue through October 2016. The area affected is parallel to the railroad tracks that are west of University Avenue from 73rd Avenue NE on the north end, to Mississippi Street NE on the south end, passing through the western edges of Fridley Community Park and Plaza Park. A half-mile stretch of Rice Creek Trail is currently closed in this area.

Old Springbrook boardwalk, almost 30 years old

Springbrook Floating Boardwalk

One of the most exciting improvements this fall is the replacement of the floating boardwalk at

Springbrook Nature Center.

"When first-time park guests stop into Springbrook, I always encourage them to visit the 850 feet of floating boardwalk that spans the wetlands in the southwest corner of our park," says Springbrook Director Mike Maher. "It is an incredible experience to walk atop the water, nestled amongst cattails, and peer down to see swimming turtles, ducks, geese, water striders and red-winged blackbird nests."

Most visitors find this feature to be a highlight of their visit. The floating boardwalk was installed in 1988 and has withstood 27 years of wind, rising water levels, and millions of footsteps. This use has taken its toll and replacement of the walkway became necessary for safety and accessibility.

Stormwater Upgrades

We are excited to continue efforts to help keep the River clean. On July 14, the Mississippi Watershed Management Organization (MWMO) provided \$342,000 to the City of Fridley for additional water quality improvements as a part of the 2015 Street Project. These funds will not only help treat stormwater runoff, but will also allow for sanitary sewer reconstruction to improve performance and reduce sewer maintenance. These sewer improvements include the following areas:

Horizon Drive from 3rd Street to 53rd Avenue

The new boardwalk will be 8 feet wide and will feature an observation and education platform outside of the walkway. This will allow plenty of space for strollers, wheelchairs, and walkers to pass, and provide a special place where students can access the water to explore, observe and monitor water quality.

Public Works staff is currently working on this upgrade and expect it to be ready for use by early-to-mid October.

Celebrating Fridley's Past

A quiet little schoolhouse, built in 1931, still stands near Hayes Elementary. Even when the tornadoes of 1965 tore apart Hayes, this building stood unscathed. It was once known as the Fridley District 23 School, later as Hayes Annex, and now it is the Fridley History Center.

The schoolhouse was scheduled for demolition in 1985, until a group of volunteers banded together to save it, and the Fridley Historical Society was born. The museum now serves the Fridley community by preserving our rich history. We are fortunate to have such a resource for our city, and much like our history, the Fridley History Center is unique. We are the only community in Anoka County to have our own local museum.

The sheer number of events planned by the Fridley Historical Society this year alone is amazing. Their commemoration of the 1965 tornadoes received state-wide coverage across major television stations and newspapers, resulting in a record-setting attendance of over 800 guests at the ceremony on May 6, 2015.

"I learned so much," says Fridley Historical Society president and event organizer Dorothy Gargaro. "I had no idea how many people were impacted and continue to be passionate about those tornadoes until I started hearing the stories." Now you can share in those heartfelt stories through a permanent exhibit available at the Fridley History Center.

Board member Al Taylor was also instrumental in the months leading up to the tornado memorial. Al, author of "The Night the Sirens Blew" and "Hidden Revealed" spent most of April speaking about tornado history, and he also donates a portion of his book profits back to the Fridley Historical Society. Fundraising as this non-profit organization receives no public funding. The maintenance and operation of the museum are funded through Society currently has 250 members), local fundraisers, and the tireless efforts of volunteers.



Other Popular Events This Year

 Manomin on the Mississippi – Fridley's River History Tour

This sold-out event, first introduced in 2014 by Julie Doth from the Fridley '49er Days Committee, coincides each year with '49er Days, and includes a step back in time as guests tour the city aboard a vintage bus. They are greeted at various stops by costumed characters portraying early settlers including Mr. Fridley by Mayor Scott Lund, Nancy Banfill by Dorothy Gargaro, and Mrs. Ida Riedel by Mary Ann Hoffman.

"We are always looking for more players," says Mary Ann. "The trivia nights are a fun way to welcome more people to the center, and we play all categories, not just history." They go all out with timing equipment, buzzers and even an MC!

Large Scale Recycling at Northern Stacks

A true commitment to recycling can be a challenge, well worth the effort for the impact it has on our future. But if we sometimes struggle, imagine what contractors and developers face with large projects. No one understands this better than Hyde Development and Braun Intertec as they work on the Northern Stacks/BAE Project.

"Recycling is an important aspect of projects like Northern Stacks," said Mike Beck of Braun Intertec, engineering consultant for the project. "Green demolition and construction practices are inherent in the success of all our brownfield redevelopment projects."

This project sets the bar high when it comes to recycling. They have found ways to reuse hundreds of thousands of tons of material, effectively minimizing the scrap and debris that goes to landfills. Recycling as many materials as possible is not only good for the environment; it also reduces the overall project cost – a Win-Win.

Here is a partial list of the many materials recycled, salvaged or reused at Northern Stacks in Fridley:


- Asphalt from the site is being mixed with crushed concrete slabs, columns and foundations from the buildings and reused as an aggregate base for pavement areas like parking lots and roads.
- Metal rebar and mesh associated with the concrete has been recovered and recycled.
- Glass and the mercury inside light bulbs has been reclaimed and recycled.

- Structural steel and non-structural metals (e.g. tin, aluminum) were recovered.
- Copper was found on site in many forms and was recycled to the extent practical.
- Electrical switchgears, transformers, breakers, and generators were recycled.
- Boiler room equipment, chillers, computer room equipment and cooling systems, air compressors, five large cranes, smoke ventilators, steel platforms, and garbage cans were salvaged. All other electronics and equipment were recycled.
- Even old office furniture was recycled by removing fabric and plastic parts in order to recycle the metal components.

Now that is business recycling!

Fridley Fire Explorers Complete at State Fair

The "Great Minnesota Get-Together" with food, fun, friends and fire? August heat is nothing compared to rushing into a burning building wearing several pounds of gear. The dedicated young adults in the Fridley Fire Explorers know this well as they proved at this year's Minnesota State Fair.

The Governor's Fire Prevention Day at the fair was August 28. This 17th annual event brought fire safety messages to over 100,000 people in a single day. Fair-goers learned about fire safety, saw vintage fire trucks, and witnessed the Explorer Challenge. Fire Explorers competed in 6 different events in which they were timed and judged. Events include raising ladders, CPR, spinal mobilization, presenting a public education topic, and performing search and rescue inside a simulated building. Vehicle extrication, a crowd favorite, was performed twice that day by Fridley Explorers.

The Fridley Explorer program allows young adults, 14-21 years, the exciting opportunity to explore a career as a firefighter.

"Fire Explorers gain a very impressive skillset," says program lead Firefighter Dean Knowles, "Skills that get noticed by college recruiters and future employers in any field."

Explorers learn side-by-side from working firefighters as they participate in training drills, learn about fire equipment and how to use it, receive first aid and CPR training, ride along on



real fire calls, attend community events as a member of the Fridley Fire Department, and gain real-world experience by shadowing firefighters on scheduled shifts.

The Fridley Fire Explorer program was first established in 1986. Today, they have 8 young adults training in these life-saving skills. Last year, Fridley took an impressive 3rd place in the State Fair Explorer Challenge against posts from all around the state. This year, competition was a little tougher, but they still worked hard and made an impressive display of the skills they are learning in the program.

The Fridley Fire Explorer program is open to youth in and around the area interested in exploring a career in firefighting and/or just wanting to gain some incredible life-skills. Hear the Beep Where You Sleep

Location matters – Every bedroom needs a working smoke alarm! If you were asked how many smoke alarms are in your home, could you answer? If you're like most of us, you may not pay much attention to where smoke alarms have been installed.

Fire Prevention Week is October 4-10. This is our chance to remind you that small measures can save lives. This year's theme: Hear the Beep Where You Sleep emphasizes the importance of location when it comes to smoke alarms. Alarms should be installed inside each bedroom, outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home including the basement.

"In a fire, seconds count," says John Berg, Fridley Fire Chief. "Half of home fire deaths result from fires reported at night between 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. when most people are asleep. Home fire alarms can alert people to a fire before it spreads, giving everyone enough time to get out."

According to the latest National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) research, working smoke alarms cut the chance of dying in a fire in half. Meanwhile, three out of five deaths resulted from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.

10 seconds + 1 finger = a life saved

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area and on every level of the home
- Interconnect all smoke alarms. This way, when one sounds, they all do.
- Test alarms at least once a month. Simply push
 the test button 10 seconds + 1 finger = a life
 saved
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old or if they don't respond properly.
- Make sure everyone knows the sound and understands what to do when they hear the smoke alarm.
- If the smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside.
- Go to your outside meeting place. Call 9-1-1 from outside the home.


Belong to TEDxFridley on October 30

Leaves! Leaves! Leaves!

Don't "leave" it up to nature to break down your leaf pile; try mulching them with your mower so that your grass can use the nutrients (and save you \$\$ on fertilizer and energy on raking).

What to do with those leaf piles after the kids or grandkids have jumped in them?

Recycle them other ways:

- 1. Check with your hauler for disposal
- 2. Take them to a County Compost site: one is near Bunker Hills and one is near Wargo Nature Center. You can find more details by calling 763-323-5730 or check out the County website: www.co.anoka.mn.us and type composting in the search bar. There is a fee of \$5 per 4 cubic yards, and you need to take your bags home with you.

Please keep all leaves out of the street since they can clog stormdrains or cause pollution.

And please keep them out of the creeks and ditches (even along the banks). They can add phosphorus to our creeks, ponds, and lakes. Why? Excess phosphorus can lead to algae blooms which can cause fish die-offs.

- If you feel intimidated or threatened, do not hesitate to call 9-1-1.
- Be wary of any request to wire money out of the country, no matter who is requesting it. A common scam is aimed towards seniors when their "grandchild" calls (often from a bad connection) or emails asking for money to get them out of trouble or a bad situation. Always take the time to verify a friend or family member's whereabouts before sending money.
- If it costs you money, you did not win a prize. If someone is requesting that you send money in order to "process" or "ship" a prize, grant or lottery winnings or to pay taxes on the winnings; or if a foreign politician or royalty is offering to send you money asking you to keep a portion and wire the rest back, it is a scam. Cashier's checks and money orders can be faked, and it can take weeks after your bank releases funds to discover a check is bad. You will still be liable for the amount of that bad check.
- Caller ID can be faked or manipulated. If a caller is asking for personal information, money or using aggressive tactics, no matter what the caller ID displays, be cautious. Hang up and do your research and/or request an official letter be sent to you explaining the situation in detail. If you receive a call displaying your own name and phone number, it is best not to answer.
- We may live in Minnesota, but not all fishing involves walleye. Phishing is a method of obtaining personal information, often through email or websites, by impersonating legitimate businesses. Fraudulent operators may copy business logos, fake URLs and use fear and urgency to convince you to provide information that can be used for identity theft. Use antispyware software and virus protection on your computers and update it regularly. When in doubt, call the publicly-listed phone number for a company to verify.

Planners never seem to stop planning. They are driven by a desire to improve their communities and make processes smoother and more logical.

The Metropolitan Land Planning Act requires that every community in the seven-county metro area prepare and submit, every 10 years, a comprehensive plan to the Metropolitan FROM THE CHAIR Council. These plans outline each community's plans for future growth and development in

response to the Council's regional development guide. Our staff is currently preparing System Statements, which are individualized for each community in the region. The System Statements explain how Thrive

MSP 2040 and our system and policy plans affect each community. After receiving their System Statements by the end of September, communities have three years to prepare and complete their local plans.

Many cities have professional staff to do this work and need little help from the Council, but smaller communities often need additional resources. That's where our planners and community development teams come in.


This fall we are unveiling an improved online clearinghouse of guidance, information, and technical assistance for communities who are working to complete their comprehensive plans. The Local Planning Handbook will include a resource library on subjects like transportation, housing, parks, and land use. Simple, plain-language "how to" sections will help local planners and officials understand what is required to be included in their local plans. Staff contact information will connect community planners with personalized technical assistance.

For communities that want to go beyond the requirements, the Handbook will provide additional data, resources, and tools.

Testing on the Handbook has been ongoing for the past six months with the help of focus groups made up of planning staff and local consultants from across the

Our staff has developed these resources in response to the needs local planners identified in surveys about the 2008 process and in recent surveys. These resources are meant to make the local planning process as easy as possible.

Central cities lead growth



Graph shows share of regional population growth between 2010 and 2014, by Thrive MSP 2040 Community Designations.


The seven-county Twin Cities metro region grew by about 130,000 people between April 2010 and April 2014, according to population estimates issued by the Metropolitan Council in July.

Minneapolis and Saint Paul have led the region in population growth since 2010. Both cities now have the highest population they've had since the 1970s. Together, the two cities accounted for 33% of the region's population growth since 2010.

The growing population in the central cities reflects both an increased preference for walkable, amenity-rich neighborhoods and the new residential construction along the METRO Green Line.

But while the central cities led in population growth, growth occurred in a balanced fashion across the region. Urban, Suburban, Suburban Edge, and Emerging Suburban Edge communities (designations in Thrive MSP 2040) all grew at a healthy pace between 2010 and 2014. Visit metrocouncil.org for details.





Regional housing plan amendment guides local plans

When the 2040 Housing Policy Plan was adopted in December 2014, the Council indicated it would amend the plan in 2015 to include additional information. The Council approved the amendment in July.

The housing plan is the region's first in nearly 30 years. It provides guidance to local officials as they address housing and housing affordability in their local comprehensive plans

Council officials say the amendment will help local communities plan by clarifying:

- · The need for affordable housing.
- . What communities must include in the housing element of local comprehensive plans.
- · How the Council will review the housing element.


The Council developed the language in this amendment in partnership with working groups made up of city and

county staff, elected officials, developers, and housing advocates," said Libby Starling, the Council's Manager of Regional Policy and

"These are people who well understand the kind of guidance that would be helpful to local planners, and appreciate the need for and challenges of creating housing opportunities for people of all incomes and life stages," Starling said.

The plan amendment includes the Affordable Housing Need for the region overall in the 2021-2030 decade, and the allocation of affordable housing need for each metro area community.

Starling says information about housing need will be included in System Statements that metro area communities will receive from the Council in September. The System Statements will inform local planning and launch the local planning process, so that local and regional plans are



Regional Solicitation process yields good results

Local officials had high praise for the process that netted \$177 million in local transportation projects slated for construction throughout the region in 2017-2019.

The region's Transportation Advisory Board (TAB) selected, in a competitive process called the Regional Solicitation, a host of transportation projects from across the region. The TAB placed the projects into the 2016-2019 Transportation improvement Program (TIP) to receive federal funding, and adopted the TIP in August.

Projects selected include local highway, transit, bikeway, pedestrian enhancements, and air quality improvement projects in the metro area that local units of government submitted for funding consideration. They will leverage an additional \$132 million in local matching funds.

The 51 projects selected include investment in all seven counties in the region, in 40 different cities and townships.


interests of the community and region as well."

In 2010, the Council awarded the City of Minneapolis over \$1 million in Livable Communities funds for Wellington Management took it from there, building the \$12 million complex on the small Hi-Lake Triangle near the Lake Street Midtown Station, incorporating features like a covered pathway to the station platform, and a stormwater system that doubles as a water feature.

"This particular project was fairly complicated in terms of financing and land assembly," said Steve Wellington. "The concept behind it, however, is pretty simple; connect the places where people live with the places they want to go. It's cost effective, desirable, and marketable.'

Council officials say the benefits of the development are many, helping to achieve regional goals of affordable housing, enhancing community and livability, and promoting prosperity and vitality.

Municipal consent under way for revised Southwest LRT project. After making \$250 million in project scope reductions recommended by communities along the planned Southwest LRT line in early July, the Council approved reinitiating the municipal consent process. The Council, Hennepin County, and the Hennepin County Regional Railroad Authority held a public hearing on the revised project plans in late August. Each of the five cities along the line will set their own hearing dates. The process must be completed by Oct. 11.

Demonstration project connects workers to Jobs. The Council, in partnership with Ramsey County and the Metropolitan Airports Commission, planned to launch a demonstration transit program in late August. The goal is to get disadvantaged workers to jobs at Minneapolis-Saint Paul International Airport between 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. when transit options are extremely limited. The Council will use Transit Lirik vans to pick up workers at select locations on the East Side of Saint Paul and deliver them to the airport where workers are needed by airport vendors.

More than 1 million rides. Both the METRO Blue and Green Lines had more than 1 million riders during the month of July. Ridership on all Metro Transit modes – local and express buses, Northstar and light rail – is up nearly 5% compared to the first seven months of 2014.

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Council makes grants for stormwater reuse

The Metropolitan Council recently approved two grants for innovative best management practices to improve water quality in local watersheds.

The projects in Waconia and at the Minnesota Zoo are the latest examples of the Council's commitment to find solutions to reduce stormwater runoff and improve surface water quality.

Both projects will be visible and include a public education component, said Judy Sventek, manager of Water Resources Assessment at the Council. The projects also were rated highly for being innovative and widely replicable by others.

The Council awarded \$400,000 for a project in Waconia that will capture untreated stormwater and reuse it to irrigate ball fields within a city-owned park. The project will conserve the potable water that would otherwise be used on the fields. It will also create a local stormwater

reuse utility network that allows nearby private landowners to tap into the reuse system.

The Council awarded \$350,000 to the Vermillion River Watershed Joint Powers Organization to address local flooding and surface water runoff problems at the Minnesota Zoo in Dakota County. Heavy rains in recent years have caused flooding at the main pond in the center of the zoo, closing trails and impacting exhibits.

One project being considered is collecting water from the roof of the massive Tropical Building (adjacent to the main pond) and reusing it to water plant exhibits inside the building.

Approval of a third grant to the City of Hugo for stormwater reuse to irrigate a park was expected in late August.

Work on all projects is scheduled for completion in 2016.
