- Replaced City Hall server.





CODE ENFORCEMENT



Help Code Enforcement Work for You. Understanding the Code Enforcement Process!

Code awareness and compliance promotes the health, safety, and appeal of our community. The code process in Spring Lake Park is complaint driven and relies on assistance from the public. Here is how you can get in touch with us.

Code enforcement begins with a complaint. Complaints can be made by residents, the general public, or any city department. Generalized complaints regarding particular violations or neighborhoods are welcome. Complainant information is always kept anonymous. Code enforcement staff then conducts an inspection to identify violations present at the property of concern. Once verified, code staff becomes the complaint source and any information provided by the initial complainant will be used solely for the purpose of providing updates upon request. Code Enforcement will work with responsible individuals diligently and courteously until the matter is resolved. Please be aware that this process may take several weeks or months depending on the conditions requiring attention.

When making a complaint please be as specific as possible regarding the location (address & street of the property in violation) as well as a complete description of the conditions. There are several ways you can share your concerns with Code Enforcement:

Help Keep Fire Hydrants Clear This Winter Why Clearing Hydrants Matters

In an emergency, firefighters rely on quick access to water to fight fires effectively. A buried hydrant can delay the response time, potentially putting lives and property at greater risk. Taking a few minutes to clear snow away from a hydrant near your home or business ensures it can be used without delay.

How to Shovel Out a Hydrant

- 1. **Locate Your Nearest Hydrant:** Take note of the hydrant closest to your property before the heavy snow falls.
- 2. Clear a 3-Foot Radius: Remove snow around the hydrant to create a clear area that gives firefighters room to work.
- 3. **Shovel a Path to the Street:** Ensure there's a path leading to the hydrant so crews can access it quickly.




Do Not Deposit Snow in Public Streets

As a reminder, according to **State Statute 160.2715**, it is prohibited to deposit snow onto public streets. This regulation is in place to help ensure the safety and accessibility of our roadways for everyone in the community.

We kindly ask all residents and property owners to refrain from moving or depositing snow onto city streets when clearing driveways, sidewalks, or other areas. Your cooperation in following this regulation will help keep our streets safe and clear for snowplows and emergency vehicles.

Winter Parking Restrictions are in Effect

Just a reminder, do not park on any city street between the hours of 2:00 AM to 8:00 AM. Also, we are in the midst of winter, meaning we will get more snow. With that being said, there is no parking regardless of the time of day on city streets if there is a snowfall of more than three (3) inches of snow until the streets are plowed curb to curb. This is to allow Public Works to make sure the streets are clear and prevent damage to the equipment.



Household Safety Tips

The following are some basic safety tips to help keep you and your family safe throughout the year.

- Check electrical cords frequently for frayed wires or loose plugs. Nearly 32% of all deaths caused by residential electrical systems are a result of faulty cords and plugs.
- Have a qualified professional inspect your heating/cooling system annually.
- If you use a space heater, keep it vented, away from walkways, and at least three (3) feet away from items such as curtains, rugs and furniture.
- Make sure rooms have the proper lighting. Use the recommended size light bulb in each fixture.
- Use only GFCI (Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter) outlets in the bathroom or near kitchen sinks.
- If you suspect a gas leak, call your supplier immediately from a safe location, and also call 9-1-1.
- Have a fully stocked first-aid kit handy.

Winter Driving Safety Tips

We understand we talked about this last year, but it is always a good reminder! Please be mindful when driving, especially if there is snow and/or ice on the roadways. Plan for extra time to get to your destination, and don't follow other vehicles too closely. You want to have a safe stopping distance to prevent any crash or other incident. Make sure to turn your headlights on in any type of precipitation – rain, snow, sleet, hail, fog, smoke, etc. per MN State Statute 169.48. Do NOT rely on the automatic lights as they may not turn on the headlights and tail lights. Avoid risky driving behaviors. Do not text or drive distracted, obey all speed limits and drive for the road conditions, and always drive sober. Remember to wear your seatbelt!



Staying Healthy

Being active and practicing good hygiene will help keep everyone feeling great this winter season. Keep yourself and others healthy by following these tips.

- Wash your hands with soap and water, especially after coughing or sneezing.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces to prevent the spread of germs.
- Stay active by exercising or getting some daily physical activity.
- Eat well-balanced meals with plenty of fruits and vegetables.
- Make sure to get enough sleep.
- Join a new group or activity to keep things fresh. Check out our activities with the Parks and Recreation Department!



With the remodeling of City Hall and the Police Department, we do not have the medication drop box available. There are a number of pharmacies and neighboring police departments that do have a drop box available. Please visit https://www.anokacountymn.gov/2930/Prescription-Drug-Take-Back-Sites for various locations or a postage-paid, pre-addressed envelope for disposal by Stericycle. Remember, do not dispose of needles or other medical devices in the drop boxes. They are meant for medications only.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

Carbon Monoxide 101

Carbon monoxide (CO) is a colorless, odorless, tasteless, poisonous gas. Your senses cannot detect its presence. CO is produced by anything in your home that burns fuel inefficiently. Sources can include, but are not limited to gas dryers, furnace, stove/burner or water heater, fireplace, automobile fumes, and portable heaters.

It is important to have a CO alarm for early warning and detection. MN State Law requires that every home have at least one CO alarm within 10 feet of every room legally used for sleeping. If people sleep on multiple levels, there must be a CO alarm on every level.

Don't forget to occasionally press the 'test' button on your CO alarm and check its replacement date on the label. CO alarms last between five (5) and 10 years per the manufacturer's date, which is located on the back of the device.

Utility Bills

If you are not already enrolled in paperless billing but would like to sign up to receive your quarterly Utility Bills via email please contact the Utility Billing Department. Once you have enrolled in paperless billing you will no longer receive a paper bill in the mail.

Payments are due January 30, 2025. If you are unable to meet the due date, your payment should include the applicable late fee outlined on your quarterly bill.

Frequently Asked Questions about Snow Plowing

With the winter season in full gear, Public Works would like to provide some answers to the most commonly asked questions about snow plowing operations and snow removal responsibilities.



Q1. When does the City begin plowing snow?

The Public Works Director decides when to begin snow plowing operations. This decision is based upon various factors including snow accumulation, drifting of snow and icy conditions affecting travel, time of snowfall in relationship to heavy traffic, air and pavement temperatures, and weather forecast. Snow plowing is expensive and Public Works has only a limited amount of equipment and personnel to perform this work.

Q2. When will my street be snow plowed?

Streets will be snow plowed in the most efficient manner possible. This means that streets in the same vicinity will typically be plowed one after the other. However, the City has designated some streets as Priority Snow Plow Routes that may be plowed first or more often than other streets during major winter storms. These priority streets usually have more traffic and connect major sections of the city to provide emergency access for fire, police, and medical services.

Q3. Why do the snowplows sometimes come by a second time and leave a windrow of snow on the end of my driveway after I already shoveled it?

Snow plows only have to make one pass by your driveway during normal winter storms. A second pass is sometimes required during bigger winter storms to clear the entire width of the street. This sometimes results in having a windrow of heavy snow placed at the end of your driveway. This windrow might even occur the day after a major winter storm since snow plow drivers might only be able to make one pass on the day of the storm.

Q4.Can I throw the snow from my driveway into the street if the street has not been plowed?

No – this is illegal, under Minnesota State Statue 160.27. All snow removed from driveways must be placed next to the driveway on private property. It is unlawful to deposit snow from your driveway into the street, sidewalk, boulevard, or neighbor's property – regardless if plowing has or has not occurred. If you have a contractor plow snow from your driveway, it is unlawful for them to push the snow across the street and the homeowner will be responsible for these actions.

Q5.My mailbox was damaged when the snowplow came by – will the City repair it?

It depends. Most instances of damaged mailboxes occur when the snow being plowed is pushed into the mailbox and breaks it – in which case the homeowner is responsible to fix the mailbox.

The City is responsible for damaged mailboxes only if the snow plow makes a direct physical contact with the mailbox. In addition, the City will not be responsible for any irrigation systems, landscaping, trees, shrubs, or other private property installed in the City boulevard (the grass area 10 to 20 feet from the street edge) damaged by snow plowing operations.



Q6.I noticed my lawn was scalped by the snowplow – who will repair it?

The City will repair any lawns that were damaged by snow plow blades. Public Works will restore the damaged lawn by leveling out the damaged area, if necessary, and spreading black dirt, fertilizer, and seed. Lawn damage is typically limited to streets without concrete curbs.

Be Safe This Winter

Stay at least 75 feet away when traveling behind snow removal equipment of any kind. In addition, move away from the street as soon as you see the snow plow moving toward you. Snow plows are unable to stop quickly and must keep their momentum in order to keep the snow removal process going and not get stuck in heavy snow.

Holiday Lights Recycling

The City of Spring Lake Park offers free, year-round Holiday Light recycling. Bring your used lights to City Hall, located at 1301 81st Ave NE, for proper recycling. Please do not bring rope lights or decorations.



Residents are able to drop off lights Monday—Friday from 8:00AM—4:30PM in the lobby.

Gift Wrap

Many people are surprised to find out their gift wrapping paper is **not** recyclable. Typical gift wrap has metal and other things in it to make it shiny and attractive. Unfortunately, those things mean paper mills can't use it to make new paper products.



Instead of gift wrap, consider using gift bags which can be reused and recycled. Other suggestions include: using the Sunday comics, paper colored by the kids, using a scarf to wrap the present which then becomes part of the gift.

Organics Recycling

Organics are a resource, not a waste! Did you know that one-third of what you throw away is organics that can be composted? You can drop off food scraps, non-recyclable paper products (i.e. pizza boxes, paper egg cartons, paper towels, napkins, tissues, etc.), coffee grounds and more at the Spring Lake Park Compost site. When you participate in the Organics recycling program, your food scraps and non-recyclable paper products will be recycled into compost, a valuable resource that improves soil, reduces erosion and decreases the need for fertilizers.

If you would like to participate it is easy and FREE. Please stop

by City Hall to sign up and pick up a starter kit. Collect your organic waste in a compostable bag and tie it off. Drop your bags off in the organics dumpster at City Hall that is available 24/7 and video monitored. If you run out of bags simply stop at the front desk Monday—Friday during business hours to pick up more.


Spring Lake Park Curbside Recycling Information

The City of Spring Lake Park is contracted with Walter's Recycling and Refuse for residential recycling needs. Here are some things you should know:



Recycling Carts: Recycling carts are available in 30, 60, and 90 gallon varieties. If you need a cart, your cart is broken, or you would like to request an additional or different size cart, please contact Walter's at 763-780-8464. There is no additional charge for a cart exchange or for an additional cart.

Missed Collection: If your recycling cart was at your curb by 6:00 AM on your designated collection day and it was not picked up by 6:00 PM, please call Walter's at 763-780-8464 by noon the day following your missed pick up. Please remember to leave your recycling cart out so the hauler will be able to pick it up after we report the missed collection.





Extra Cardboard: Cardboard boxes can be flattened and tied into bundles no more than three (3) feet by three (3) feet by one (1) foot tall and placed next to your recycling cart. There is no charge for additional recycling.

ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION

Help Keep Our Storm Drains Clean

Snowmelt can lead to flooding if storm drains are not regularly cleaned. The city and the Coon Creek Watershed District encourage you to join *Adopt-a-Drain* to help keep storm drains free of debris, also known as *illicit discharges*. By participating, you will help prevent flooding due to snowmelt and protect water in lakes, ponds and streams in your community. Signing up is quick and easy—visit *mn.adopt-a-drain.org*.



City ordinance 494 prohibits anything other than water from entering the streets or storm drains. If you see anyone spilling, dumping or disposing any of the materials listed below into a storm drain or on the street report it immediately to the Public Works

Department at 763-784-6491. If you think the material may be hazardous, call 9-1-1 – the Fire Department will respond to emergency responses for contamination and spills.

These materials, which are considered *Illicit Discharges*, may include:

- Grass clippings or leaves
- Pet Waste
- Sand or dirt
- Fertilizer
- Motor oil and grease
- Pesticides or herbicides
- Paint
- Winter de-icers/salt



A Reminder to Dog Owners

As temperatures drop and snow begins to fall, it's essential to continue picking up after your dog, even in your backyard. Dog waste contains harmful bacteria, like *E. coli*, and excess nutrients that can wash into storm drains during the winter. These drains carry the waste into lakes, ponds and streams, where it can make the water unsafe for activities like fishing and swimming and can harm aquatic life.

To help minimize these impacts, dog waste should be disposed of properly in trash bins or designated pet waste stations.

To help residents properly dispose of their dog's waste, the Coon Creek Watershed has installed 10 new pet waste stations in the drainage of Springbrook Creek (its subwatershed). One is in Spring Lake Park's own **Sanburnol Park!** Located on the east side of

the parking lot, this station is maintained weekly and provides a reliable source for residents to properly dispose of their dog's waste. To find out more about this project, check out our webpage at https://www.cooncreekwd.org/pws-project.

By using trash bins or pet waste stations, you can help protect the waterways and wildlife in your community, ensuring a cleaner and safer environment for everyone. So, this winter remember to pick up the dog waste!
